2012 teen rape case goes to jurors

Prosecutors and the defense made closing arguments yesterday in the Superior Court of Guam whether 22-year-old Austin Barcinas raped a 14-year-old in 2012.

According to prosecutor Sean Brown, DNA evidence and testimony from witnesses is proof enough that Barcinas should be found guilty.

Barcinas faces charges of fourth-, second- and first-degree criminal sexual conduct, as well as assault with intent to commit criminal sexual conduct.

Details of alleged assault He is accused of having sexually

penetrated the victim while she was asleep at his house in Mangilao. The victim was a guest, sleeping over with other family members at Barcinas' home.

The victim, who testified in court, stated that on the night in question, she was sleeping on a couch in Barcinas' living room. She woke in the middle of the night in pain, and went to her home, where immediate family members later took her to Guam Memorial Hospital, and eventually, to the Healing Hearts Rape Crisis Center.

According to Brown, semen was discovered on the interior of the victim's underwear and DNA tests link Barcinas to the sample.

Testimony from a rape expert called into trial also supported the allegations of sexual assault. On the stand. the victim testified that she woke up to bleeding and pain, according to Brown.

Brown also pointed out that while in prison, Barcinas made phone calls to his mother. brother and sister, asking different family members to speak to the victim. When asked about the phone calls.

the defendant's family members denied recollection of the calls, even though phone records showed that calls occurred in 2016. According to Brown, this is further evidence that Barcinas was attempting to hide his

thing," Brown said. "They know something and that's why they're doing everything in their power to protect the defendant and say whatever they need to say to help him. They know what happened that night to (the victim)."

One of the family members even

asked the victim to drop the case, according to Brown.

"Who are they trying to protect?

However, according to the defense, the DNA evidence did not hold as strong a case as prosecutors were presenting.

How good a DNA report is this?" attorney Rocky Kingree asked in court.

Kingree explained that the prosecution's own forensic expert, who linked the defendant to the semen sample, said there were actually two or more semen samples from the crime scene. Additionally, there was no semen found on or in the victim's body.

Defense points to victim's stepfather

The defense attorney also attempted to shift blame for the rape to another male the victim knew; her stepfather.

According to Kingree, two hair samples were found in the victim's underwear that did not belong to the victim. When tested, these hair samples were found to belong to a Caucasian man with brown hair. Kingree pointed out that his client has black hair and is of Chamorro and

Palauan heritage.

But Kingree added that the victim's stepfather is Caucasian, and that after the case went into investigation, the victim and her family moved from Guam.

A verdict in the case has not yet been reached.

Father, 18, allegedly threatens son with slingshot

An 18-year-old father was charged in the Superior Court of Guam yesterday after allegedly threatening his son with a makeshift slingshot.

Police responded to a disturbance at the Bonanza Apartments in Tamuning on Monday around 6:30 p.m., where a witness told them a man, later identified as Setarcon Altly, was causing a disturbance.

The witness said Altly tried to use a slingshot to shoot a rock at his son. who felt threatened after his father pointed it at his chest, according to the magistrate's complaint.

Upon approaching Altly, officers observed the man smelled of an intoxicating beverage emitting from his body. Police added he had red, bloodshot eyes, and disheveled clothing and hair.

The complaint further stated that Altly told police he had been drinking vodka, and that, when he drinks, he forgets his actions. He also admitted the slingshot was his.

Police confiscated the slingshot that Altly used.

Altly was charged with disorderly conduct as a petty misdemeanor and harassment as a petty misdemeanor.
