In August 2025, 17-year-old Mia Lee, a recent graduate from St. John's School Guam, competed at the AAU Junior Olympic Games in Houston, Texas.

She earned gold in the 50m freestyle, 100m freestyle, 200m freestyle, 400m freestyle, and 100m butterfly, along with silver medals in the 200m individual medley and the 100m backstroke events.

Gandaoli said it takes more than just individual talent to reach this level.

"It takes the dedication of family, the commitment of our exceptional coaching staff, and the unwavering support of our community and sponsors," Gandaoli said. "Mia's journey is a testament to what can be achieved through hard work and passion, and we are excited to cheer her on as she represents the United States on the international stage."

Her 50m freestyle performance of 27.45 set an AAU Junior Olympics record.

"This is an incredible, well-deserved honor for Mia, and a milestone for our team and our island,"

Jolenna Gandaoli, president of Amphibious Aquatics, said in a statement. "We extend our sincerest congratulations to Mia and her family on this historic achievement."

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Micro Beach, American Memorial Park, Garapan. The starting ceremony will be held at 4:30 a.m., with the race "departing the station" at 5 a.m. The finish line closes at 9 p.m.

"Reviving this historic railway route alongside our partners from Japan holds meaning for both our community and our tourism industry," MVA Managing Director Jamika R. Taijeron said in a statement. "This journey run brings the Marianas' Far From Ordinary brand to life by connecting athletes and visitors to the stories, landscapes, and shared history that makes our islands unique. As we continue improving our tourism products, we will explore the potential for growing this event, as it strengthens our ties with Japan while creating new experiences for visitors."

During the Japanese era, the Marianas was a major hub for sugarcane cultivation, with a legendary 50-mile narrow-gauge railway encircling Saipan, transporting sugarcane and goods—a legacy with remnants still found through the island's landscape. Similar railways once ran

on the neighboring island of Tinian and Rota.

The story of The Marianas is a rich tapestry, woven from the heritage of the indigenous Chamorro and Carolinian people, and seasoned by centuries of Spanish, German, Japanese, and American influence.

During the endurance run, participants will also have the opportunity to fortify themselves with authentic local food at aid stations manned by local agencies and businesses, from Mt. Tapochau's base to Capital Hill, Banzai Cliff, Micro Beach and other spots.

"We anticipate that runners will be on the course from pre-dawn until after dark," MVA community projects manager Martin Duenas said. "We ask everyone's cooperation in making this inaugural race a safe success by restraining pet dogs along the route on Saturday and staying alert for runners along the road throughout the day. We appreciate everyone's support."

Safety, self-sufficiency, and respect for the Marianas' natural and historical heritage are top priorities for the race.

Participants must navigate using official course maps, pass all checkpoints, and carry mandatory night gear and cell phones.
