Woodard reported a review of the complaint, during which it was determined that there had been no direct interaction between the provider and the complainant, as the issue involved delays in scheduling rather than the provision of care. It was explained that the complaint stemmed from a family member's concern that a patient was unable to obtain timely healthcare because the nurse practitioner did not see the patient, resulting in a delay that was described as unfortunate; however, it was concluded that the circumstances did not fall within the scope of a valid complaint and did not establish sufficient grounds for investigation or disciplinary action by the Board.  <i>Motion to Dismiss: G. 		<p><b>3. GBNE-CO-25-002</b>  The Board was briefed on an ongoing matter that originated from a communication received in November from colleagues at the Board of Medicine concerning a provider practicing independently as an advanced practice registered nurse and potentially operating outside the authorized scope of practice. Following a review of the clinic's publicly available information, it was noted that the clinic advertised the administration of ketamine for psychiatric and pain management purposes, which was determined to be inconsistent with the scope of practice recognized by the certifying organization for advanced practice nurses, and given that ketamine is a scheduled drug, the situation was assessed as posing a potential risk to public safety. As a result, after consultation with the executive officer of the Guam Board of Medical Examiners, a cease and desist letter was issued directing the clinic to halt the administration of ketamine pending further clarification. It was further reported that the subject of the complaint retained legal counsel, submitted Freedom of Information requests that were fulfilled, and subsequently requested that the Board consider rescinding the cease and desist order. Because the issue arose between scheduled Board meetings, the action had been taken to address immediate concerns, and the matter was now formally presented to the Board for determination on whether the cease and desist order should remain in effect while the outstanding issues are resolved.</p> <p>Dr. Varghese requested clarification regarding whether the advanced practice registered nurse was administering a medication that fell outside the authorized scope of practice. 	<p>order due to a perceived risk to public safety. It was further articulated that the assessment of psychiatric conditions and the prescribing of a scheduled drug for such conditions were believed to be outside the scope of practice for a certified registered nurse anesthetist, based on consultation with the applicable credentialing body.</p> <p>Dr. Varghese raised questions about the potential impact of discontinuing the medication on the affected patient and the availability of alternative care given Guam's limited number of practitioners, to which G. Woodard responded that ketamine is not FDA approved for the treatment of depression and that other treatment options are available. Additional clarification was sought regarding the scope of practice and whether the APRN had been contacted directly, and it was reported that after the cease and desist letter was issued, the APRN referred all communication to legal counsel, reinforcing the decision to act promptly to fulfill the Board's responsibility to protect public safety.</p> <p>Additional clarification was provided that the cease and desist order applied to a certified registered nurse anesthetist, and it was explained that while ketamine is commonly administered by nurse anesthetists in perioperative settings, concerns arose because the clinic's representations suggested independent evaluation, diagnosis of psychiatric conditions, and treatment outside a surgical context. It was emphasized that diagnosing psychiatric conditions was not believed to fall within the appropriate scope of practice for a certified registered nurse anesthetist, and it was acknowledged that the inability to communicate directly with the APRN following referral to legal counsel limited opportunities for informal resolution.</p> <p>G. Woodard reported that the intent of the action was not punitive but protective of public safety, despite perceptions to the contrary, and members were asked to consider whether to maintain or rescind the cease and desist order while the matter continued to be reviewed.</p> <p>Dr. Varghese raised further questions and concerns regarding the APRN'S licensure status, patient impact, prevalence of the treatment on Guam, and the limited availability of psychiatric providers. She expressed her preference to await additional guidance and input from legal counsel and potentially the provider.</p> <p>G. Woodard recognized that the issue was complex and extended beyond some members' areas of expertise, but the Board's responsibility to oversee and regulate nursing practice was reaffirmed. A proposal was then presented to extend the cease and desist order on the administration of ketamine until the next Board meeting, at which time the outcome of further discussions with legal counsel could be considered and</p>

		<p>formally communicated based on the Board's vote.</p> <p>M. Gay emphasized the need for further medical and legal clarification, including whether the APRN had appropriate oversight regarding scope of practice and whether the cease and desist correspondence had been reviewed for legal sufficiency, with the view that consultation with the Attorney General's Office should occur before any final action was taken. She supported maintaining the cease and desist order until more information was obtained and legal guidance was received.</p> <p>G. Woodard reiterated that the matter was being brought before the full Board to ensure collective decision-making rather than unilateral action. P. J. Calalo also gave his consensus to hold the matter and seek legal advice, after which G. Woodard formally moved to continue the cease and desist order until the next Board meeting, at which time the CRNA would be invited to appear and respond to questions.</p> <p>B. Sablan also placed on the record that a demand letter seeking revocation of the cease and desist had been received on December 16, with a stated deadline of December 19, 2025, and notice that legal action could be pursued if the Board declined to comply, which was acknowledged as a significant consideration for the Board. <i>Motion to Continue with the Cease and Desist until Next Meeting: G. 

Woodard discussed the status of the proposed Rules and Regulations, noting that prior revisions had been completed based on recommendations from a former attorney, with no substantive changes to the content aside from grammatical corrections. It was explained that the revised draft had been intended for submission to the Legislature for adoption; however, due to the departure of the reviewing attorney and changes in executive leadership, the process was delayed.</p> <p>B. Sablan provided an update indicating that on January 29, correspondence was received by the HPLO office confirming that the attorney's review found the proposed rules to be generally and legally sufficient, with only minor editorial recommendations. Specifically, the attorney suggested adding a statutory citation to the Nurse Practice Act under 10 DCA Chapter 12, Article 3, Rule 7, pertaining to the Executive Officer. It was stated that once this minor edit is incorporated, the Board may proceed with scheduling a public hearing at a future meeting, as a public hearing is required prior to advancing the rules to the Legislature. B. Sablan agreed to distribute the current proposed draft, along with the newly suggested statutory language, to all Board members for review in preparation for finalization and the public hearing process.</p>	GBNE	1528	Noted

	<p><b>1. Jane Quidachay – Reinstatement (RN)</b>  The Board discussed the reinstatement application of J. Quidachay, whose nursing license has been lapsed since 2017. It was noted that, pursuant to statutory requirements, an applicant whose license has been lapsed for more than three years must complete a refresher course as part of the reinstatement process. The applicant sought guidance from the Board regarding available refresher course options, as neither the UOG nor GMH currently offers such a program.</p> <p>Board members discussed the refresher requirements, including the need for both didactic and clinical components. G. Woodard noted that prior applicants have completed an online didactic refresher course through an accredited continuing education provider, followed by arrangement of clinical hours in coordination with an employer. The Board discussed the continuing education requirement of 30 hours per biennium and calculated that, given the length of lapse from 2017 to 2026, approximately 120 continuing education hours would be necessary to account for the elapsed renewal periods. The Board noted that because the current Rules and Regulations do not specify these requirements, it may be necessary to formally establish clearer parameters or a structured pathway to guide future reinstatement applicants while ensuring public safety and professional competency.</p> <p>Dr. Calalo introduced a proposal recommending a structured pathway consisting of 20 hours of supervised clinical exposure at the CNA level, followed by 100 hours of supervised RN-level shadowing, in addition to the previously discussed 120 continuing education hours to account for the extended lapse in licensure. # HR Hub: The case for drug testing across Guam's industries

In the heart of the Pacific, Guam serves as a vital hub for regional commerce, construction, and military logistics.

However, our strategic importance brings high-risk environments—from the swinging cranes of the Port Authority of Guam to the massive infrastructure projects happening in Dededo and Tamuning.

In these areas, the difference between a productive day and a life-altering tragedy often comes down to one factor: mental agility.

Drug testing programs in the workplace are not merely a bureaucratic hur-

dle but a frontline of defense against an escalating drug crisis that threatens both the economy and the lives of our people.

Guam's battle with methamphetamine, often locally referred to as "ice," is well-documented. According to the Office of the Attorney General's "Meth Kills" campaign, methamphetamine was involved in approximately 37 accidental deaths on the island in 2024 alone.

When this crisis enters the workplace, the risks are magnified.

Impairment from illicit substances significantly degrades cognitive functions, including:

- Delayed reaction time: Crucial for heavy equipment operators.
- Poor depth perception: A fatal flaw in construction and maritime operations.
- Impaired judgment: Leading to the bypassing of safety protocols.

The necessity of rigorous testing is underscored by past incidents involving safety-sensitive roles. In recent years, the Port Authority of Guam—the island's literal lifeline—has faced security lockdowns after employees were found in possession of controlled

substances within restricted areas.

Similarly, in early 2024, a veteran officer with the Guam Police Department tested positive for methamphetamine after a glass pipe was discovered in a patrol vehicle.

These cases highlight a sobering reality: even those entrusted with public safety are not immune to the reach of addiction.

When a government employee or a private contractor operates a vehicle or machinery while impaired, they transform a tool of progress into a weapon.

Recent data from the Department of Administration revealed that 11 government of Guam employees tested positive for drug use in the first quarter of 2025 alone, proving that consistent monitoring remains essential to maintaining a safe environment for all citizens.

This does not include those who applied and failed their pre-employment drug test.

Drug testing programs

work through three primary mechanisms: deterrence, identification, and rehabilitation.

Pre-employment testing acts as a filter, ensuring that those entering high-risk industries are fit for duty.

Random testing, especially for Testing Designated Positions, TDPs, creates a continuous deterrent, encouraging employees to remain drug-free both on and off the clock.

Post-accident testing is a standard procedure following incidents like the 2026 chemical spill in Barrigada involving transport vehicles. While not every accident is drug-related, post-accident screening provides the forensic data necessary to improve safety protocols and determine if impairment played a role.

A common point of confusion on the island involves the use of cannabis, or marijuana.

While Public Law 35-5 decriminalized recreational marijuana for adults, Executive Order 2019-11 remains the governing

standard for GovGuam employees. It explicitly maintains a drug-free workplace policy that prohibits marijuana use, reflecting the reality that "legal" does not mean "safe for work."

For safety-sensitive roles, the standard remains zero tolerance to ensure that coordination and focus are never compromised.

Workplace safety on Guam is more than just following OSHA guidelines. It is about protecting our neighbors, coworkers, and families.

By identifying substance abuse early through testing, employers can provide the necessary "Safe Harbor" environment for rehabilitation or to prevent a catastrophic failure before it happens.

As we continue to build a stronger, more resilient Guam, maintaining a drug-free workforce is the only way to ensure every worker returns home safely at the end of the shift.
